A Little Improvisation:

Whitcrafts turn cart barn into versatile event center with a beautiful ambiance

Having an epiphany is a serious matter when you're an architect.

Instead of wanting something to happen, you make something happen.

Jeff Whitcraft — a Lewistown native who has found his way back home — doesn't take this for granted.

He's had many ideas through the years, be it a plan for a golf course, a hotel, a bar or something else. And, in his case, he has a wife who supports the things he envisions, such as the recently constructed Cart Barn/event center at Judith Shadows Golf Course, an 18-hole golf course Jeff built on his grandfather's land three miles outside Lewistown.

The Whitcrafts opened Judith Shadows in 1997, and it's been going strong ever since. Although sometimes it's hard to imagine the business is 22 years old, Jeff said he continues to find pleasure in the work, even though it's not exactly what he expected when he chose his career.

"I first got into architecture because I didn't want to shovel," he joked. "I like art and I like construction, but I wanted to be on the office side of construction... now (being back in Central Montana) I shovel all the time."

Staying up to date

Through the years the Whitcrafts have kept busy maintaining and expanding the property, and engaging with golfers, as well as others in the community.

"Judith Shadows is always evolving," said Jeff. "We're continually modifying, updating and upgrading."

The course gets modernized often.

For instance, new sets of tees "are more forward," according to Jeff's wife Maria.

"It helps those golfers who aren't long drivers. It helps make the game more fun for them," she said. "This is a modification we acted on after listening to novice and seasoned golfers. We appreciate their comments and take their considerations to heart."

Maria and Jeff are always brainstorming ways to make Judith Shadows a great place for golfers and non-golfers alike.

"We both come up with ideas, and we

have fun working together," said Jeff. "We approach everything as a team."

The Cart Barn was no exception.

How the Cart Barn was born

Such a vision, however, was a result of misfortune. In 2011, the Whitcrafts' old cart barn housing golf carts was badly damaged during the calamitous floods, so they had to build a new one. Rather than making it a single-use facility, they improvised.

That's when the epiphany struck Jeff.

"I thought, 'why not have something else here at Judith Shadows that will bring the community together?'" he said.

"So instead of building a one-dimensional cart barn, we thought 'why not make it an event center?'" Maria added.

The Whitcrafts opened the Cart Barn in July 2017. This is their third season of hosting events, and it's wildly exceeded their expectations.

"We've done weddings, family

reunions, graduation parties, golf tournaments and other family friendly events,” Maria said. “We’re open to all kinds of events. If you need a space for 200 people, we’re happy to be of service. We have a full bar and a beautiful ambiance.”

Opening up the Cart Barn as an event center has given Maria an opportunity to meet new people.

“I can’t believe how far some of these people come for a wedding,” she said. “People drive across the country to come to this beautiful spot in the middle of nowhere.”

Maria is thrilled to see locals and businesses hosting events in the Cart Barn.

Earlier this year, for example, the Chamber of Commerce hosted a family friendly luau at the Cart Barn. Chamber Director Connie Fry said it was the perfect venue for the festivity.

“One thing I really like is that it’s an open space,” Fry said. “It can be set up to your liking. If it’s nice outside they can open the doors. You can really set it up to fit whatever you’re doing, and you can decorate it however you want.”

Creative people in the community play around with a plethora of themes. The luau was especially convivial, as many in attendance wore leis and Hawaiian shirts. Each table had pineapple-shaped party decorations, balloons and paper garlands. Children flew kites, the Lewistown Hoppers

showcased their talents and a local band kept energy levels up.

Seeing community members of all ages enjoy themselves was a great way to kick off another season, Jeff said, and he hopes to host more events in the Cart Barn this year and next.

“Like most Lewistown businesses, we’re trying to find ways to make the Cart Barn grow,” he said.

“We offer a nice, intimate space for a couple hundred people,” added Maria.

The space is also versatile, as it offers both indoor and outdoor opportunities, thanks largely to glass overhead door window walls.

“If it’s good weather, we roll them up and you don’t know they’re there. If it’s bad weather, you can sit here and look outside,” Jeff said.

Twenty-four students accompanied by a parent or guardian vied for 10 \$1,000 "Luck of the Draw" scholarships.

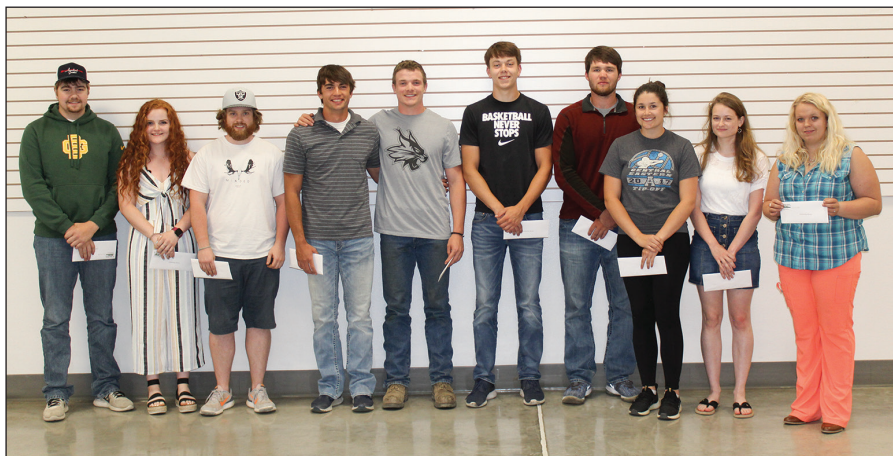
