## Investing in the future

Norm Asbjornson funds \$40 million project for Winifred Schools

Norm Asbjornson is once again making the news for his astounding philanthropic generosity, but he's not doing it for recognition.

The proud Winifred native is doing it in hopes to secure a more promising future for the youth of his beloved hometown.

After listening to the needs of the school and the community, Norm agreed to fully fund an ambitious academic and vocational program estimated to cost more than \$40 million.

"Education is one of the primary things that will make Winifred attrac-

tive," Norm said,
"It's an absolute
necessity for
schools to offer
more education."

With more education comes more opportunity, and it thrills Norm to help provide it.

"I don't want to tell the child what they have to do," Norm said. "I want them to make that choice, and I want to give them the capability to do so by having the resources available." Founder of AAON, Inc., a NASDAQ-traded heating, ventilation, and air conditioning manufacturer based in Tulsa, Oklahoma, Norm has used his wealth to benefit the Winifred community on numerous occasions. He funded the Winifred Community Center, Winifred International Suites, the Mid-State signs building, paid for the pool rehabilitation, houses for school employees, a travel bus for the Winifred athletic teams and scholarships to Montana State University for

#### Call 811 to request a locate

As your construction projects progress, please remember to call in a locate ticket for underground utilities. You can call 811 any time of the day to



request a locate. Utility companies will arrive within two business days to mark the ground to identify where underground utilities are present. Note that utility companies are not responsible for locating beyond the meter. Fergus Electric Cooperative has a locat-

ing tool to rent for members who would like to locate their underground electric cables on the member's side of the meter. Please call ahead to our operations team to reserve a time to utilize this handy tool.

#### Back to school is around the corner



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graduating students.

It gives Norm pleasure to invest in the youth, and he's encouraged by what he's seen of them thus far, by listening to them and getting a better understanding of their dreams. He's fascinated by what interests them and wants them not to feel limited in rural Montana. After all, he didn't feel limited, and a big part of that is his life philosophy, one he's happy to share.

"I look at life as one big challenge," Norm said, "and it starts with the individual. All of us are in a race to be better than some other individual. It's a competitive situation. Some are successes and some are failures. Well, I hope this little bit that I can do can help reduce the amount of failures."

Norm may phrase his most recent contribution to Winifred Public Schools as just an individual doing his part to give back to the community that raised him, but Winifred Public Schools Chairman Gordon Wichman said it's also another great example of Norm's modesty.

"I have so much respect for this man," said Gordon, who has benefited from Norm's benevolence on several occasions. It was Norm who made it possible for Gordon, his wife Mary, and their foster children to find a home (and a job, by establishing Mid-State Signs, which Gordon

manages) in Winifred.

Now Gordon is seeing Norm's beneficence in action as a school board representative. Once again, he is floored by the generosity, as Norm's financial support makes it possible for Winifred Public Schools to add lab spaces, areas for woodwork, agricultural science, car repair, a competition-standard gym with an indoor running track, and more, essentially doubling the size of the original facility.

"Norm built his fortune by being honest and upright, and when he uses his money for such a cause he never makes it about him, nor does he ask for anything in return," said Gordon. "He attributes this to his parents being such giving people."

Norm is the first to tell anyone such a donation isn't for any personal gain. He funded this project because the school board and others in the community completed a thorough analysis of what is required for the students to have the best education possible. He believes in the results and believes in the people who will see it through.

"I'm doing this because the people involved are serious about what they asked me for," Norm said. "I am an infinitely small part of the picture, but I can provide the building. If you don't have the building, you can't deliver."

This is what Norm does. It's why he has become known throughout the state for his philanthropy, particularly when it comes to education. In 2014, for example, Norm gave the Montana State University engineering program \$50 million to build a cutting-edge facility, the largest private gift in the state's history.

Four years later, Norm Asbjornson Hall opened its doors, a building that was highly praised for being Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Platinum certified by the U.S. Green Building Council. Norm was so ecstatic with how it turned out that he wanted to work with architects at A&E Design again, and he's doing so with the Winifred School expansion.

"They do an extraordinarily fine job," he said.

Norm and A&E Design have the same goal in mind with the current project: to provide modern resources to help current and future generations succeed in today's fast-paced business world.

"I want to embrace the educational opportunities that are out there, and it is my hope this benefits not just Winifred but the entire state of Montana," Norm said.

This year, the co-op received an additional \$5,000 thanks to the generosity of an anonymous donor, bringing the total fund to \$11,000. After reviewing the three lineman scholarship applications the co-op received, the Board of Directors approved increasing the scholarship fund by \$1,000 and awarding a \$4,000.00 scholarship to each of the three applicants.
