Proud to serve

Don Bost reflects on service, self-discipline and the American Legion

"A man who has nothing which he cares about more than his personal safety is a miserable creature and has no chance of being free unless made and kept so by the exertions of better men than himself." – John Stuart Mill

Fergus Post 16 Commander Don Bost keeps this quote in mind often.

"It's the quote my father gave me before I took off for Vietnam," he said.

Sitting at the American Legion Club on Main Street last month, Bost said it's this quote that helps inspire him to recruit the many veterans in central Montana.

A 49-year member of the Legion, Bost has taken it upon himself to see the establishment soar, and he's exceeded all expectations.

"We are the second-largest post in the state," he said proudly. "When I signed on as post commander, national set our goal at 214 members. We finished last year with 467 members."

Bost said he brought in 250 of these members.

"Someone just had to go talk to the veterans around here," Bost said. "They're out here, and there's no good reason not to be a Legionnaire. The American Legion is the largest supporter of veterans' rights, veterans' programs and veterans' health. We are the largest organization in the United States in support of veterans."

As far as Bost is concerned, he

wouldn't be the man he is today if he didn't sign up for the military, and he knows others feel the same. Recruiting more members to the Legion is a way to celebrate the camaraderie involved as well as use the skills he attained.

"I learned the value of hard work," Bost said. "Personal responsibility and accountability is taught by the military. That's what keeps me pushing the Legion forward."

This drive has helped propel Bost's success his whole life, be it starting his own construction business, running Lewistown's Chamber of Commerce or running the American Legion, which includes overseeing Veterans Memorial Park and the veteran memorials at Symmes Park.

"I've been the chairman of Veterans Memorial Park for over 10 years," Bost said. "I can tell you this park wouldn't be here if it wasn't for Fergus Post 16."

Beyond developing personal responsibility and accountability, Bost loves the military because it's made him part of a fraternity, a family. He takes this seriously, looking out for the men and women who also served.

"We take care of our own," Bost said, "whether they are Legionnaires or not."

Like father, like son

Bost said he always wanted to follow in his father's footsteps and join the military.

"I was raised in a family where people went to the military," he said. "When I was a senior in high school, I just always thought that's what I was going to do: my dad did it and I'm going to do it."

However, when Bost was a senior, it was 1968. Tensions were on the rise nationally and internationally. People were getting drafted, including some of his friends.

"That was the year of the Tet Offensive in Vietnam, which is when the war really deteriorated for us," Bost said. "We thought we were winning,

Carter to Hilger transmission line

Rocky Mountain Contractors continues to rebuild the seven miles of 50 kilovolt line between the Carter Substation and Hilger. The updated line will greatly improve reliability to our members in the Hilger/Roy/ Winifred areas. We want to thank the landowners for allowing Fergus Electric Cooperative to utilize the existing rightof-way to rebuild the line. As we have shared previously, there will be several outages in the Hilger and Winifred areas that will enable contractors to complete the rebuild. Tentatively, the three outages are scheduled for early November, December and January. The outages may be up to eight hours in duration. We are aware of the inconvenience these will cause our members. Fergus Electric will only schedule these outages if temperatures are forecast to be greater than 35 degrees Fahrenheit. Effected members will be notified.

Cold weather power usage

Colder weather is upon us in central Montana. Typically as the weather turns, our members' usage goes up, which increases power bills. Although there is value in plugging in vehicles, keeping livestock water ice-free and preventing waterlines from freezing, Fergus Electric wants our members to be aware of the additional cost and to make wise decisions in their

Continued from page 3 and, then, suddenly...that wasn't the case."

Bost knew what was at stake. He signed up anyway, eager to respond to the call.

"I enlisted with the Navy in April, and left in September," he said. "Three of us from Lewistown went together. We got on the bus in front of the Gem Café, and we were off."

Although he's proud of his service now, he admits it was no picnic at the beginning.

"We went to boot camp with enthusiasm, and we woke up the next morning thinking, 'what the hell did we get ourselves into?' But by the time we got out of boot camp, we were so frickin' proud of ourselves. You feel so good because you start to evolve...it was really good for me," Bost said.

During Vietnam, Bost was a Seabee, or a member of the United States Naval Construction Battalion. "I was an equipment operator in the Mobile Construction Battalion 58," Bost said. "I enjoyed it, but it was tough. If you didn't toe your line, you were gone, so it came down to discipline. If you weren't on the ball, you weren't tolerated." to serve," Bo said. Most of Bost's service took place in Chu Lai, where each day consisted of physical training, classroom, running equipment and more physical training. It was hard work surrounded by hard realities.

"Ninety-five percent of the people in Vietnam were living in poverty," he said. "They lived in terrible conditions."

There were certainly challenges during his time overseas, but Bost said he came home a better man, particularly thanks to a more profound commitment to self-discipline, a drive he believes many in society lack today.

"Self-discipline is something we don't push anymore," he said.

However, Bost has a solution. "You can go to college, you can do

whatever you want, but you should have the call to serve.

to serve," Bost said. "That's my personal opinion." Serving in the military was invaluable for Bost, and he makes it known whenever he gets the opportunity.

MECA and Fergus offer scholarships

If you are a high school senior planning to attend college or are a student continuing an undergraduate education, you could win a scholarship. Four \$500 scholarships will be awarded to qualified students whose parents are cooperative members.

To qualify for the scholarships, the applicant must: 1) Be a member of Fergus Electric Cooperative, 2) Be a graduating high school senior with plans to attend a university or vocational/ technical school, or be an undergraduate college student, 3) Submit a completed application to Fergus Electric that includes school transcripts, ACT/SAT scores, a personal statement and one letter of recommendation, and 4) Submit entries to Fergus Electric postmarked no later than January 25, 2019, to MECA/Fergus Scholarship Committee, Fergus Electric Cooperative 84423 U.S. Highway 87, Lewistown, MT 59457.

Criteria for scholarship judging includes: 20 percent academic strength (as demonstrated by coursework, GPA and national testing scores); 20 percent activities in school and community, awards and honors; 20 percent employment, volunteerism and community service, and; 40 percent personal statement.

Fergus Electric will select one application to be forwarded to Great Falls for further judging. A MECA committee will choose the scholarship recipients from the pool of finalists. Fergus Electric will also award one scholarship from the applications.
